WASHINGTON - Vice President Garner has been offered a non-political job that will pay him more money than he ever made before. And although the V. P. is a millionaire, he's like all the rest of us—he could use more!

Every day when the senate emerges early from the submarine light of "Doc" Copeland's air-conditioned chamber, Garner and Pat Harrison stroll to the first base at Griffith ball park. Home of the Washington Americans.

Each sits there because the favorite player is First Base "Senators" Boomer, who playfully calls the vice president "Buncie."

Recently, in a humorous moment, Manager Griffith proposed Garner for the seat of baseball in place of the fading Keweenaw Mountain.

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VOTE FUNDS TO BEGIN WORK ON GRAVING DOCK

Bill Is Sent Back to House for Action on Changes

WASHINGTON, June 15. —(UP)—The senate late today passed and sent back to the house the final deficiency bill, appropriating a total of \$293,615,100.

The measure carries \$36,314,083 to start the naval expansion program. Of this sum, approximately \$19,000,000 will be used for improvements at navy shore stations and the balance will finance start of construction on additional warships.

The bill also carries \$500,000 to administer the one-hour bill.

The senate made several minor changes, and the bill was sent back to the house for final consideration.

Action was taken as the congress speeded toward adjournment tonight.

The deficiency bill includes \$1,000,000 to start construction of a new graving dock in Puget Sound navy yard and \$2,500,000 for other improvements in the yard.

Another 40 Men Called To Yard Jobs

Additional repair work, caused by the extra dockings of three vessels coming to the navy yard soon, has necessitated the calling of 40 more workers to report for duty.

The work called today to report for duty include 15 ship-fitters, 15 shipfitter helpers and 10 laborers. The total number of men taken into the naval plant over less than a two-week period now amounts up to 307 workers.

BACK INITIATIVE Labor Council Supports 135; Silent on Power Bill

Endorsement of Initiative No. 135, one of two proposed 40-hour tax limit measures, was voted last Monday by the Central Trades and Labor council after speakers compared it with Initiative No. 129, for which it is proposed to substitute. Petitions were delivered to the council members for circulation following the meeting.

Joseph Clark, organizer for the State and Municipal Employees' union also led a number of petitions on the civil service for state employees' initiative for signature. This initiative, which would place all state employees in classified service, is numbered 128. Clark made a plea for support of the measure.

Thumbs were turned down on the proposal to endorse the initiative following the meeting. He also made arrangements for Maj-Gen. W. C. Stever's call in the navy yard early next week.

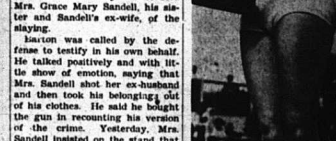
BRITISH VESSEL BOMBED, SUNK

McCall Held Guilty on Charges of Abduction

MIAMI, Fla. June 15.—(UP)—Circuit Judge J. F. Atkinson today found Franklin Pierce McCall, a 31-year-old farmhand, guilty of kidnaping five-year-old Jimmy Cash at Princeton, Fla., and set a 10 m. tomorrow for sentencing him.

McCall testified in his own behalf after pleading guilty to a charge of abducting the boy. Maximum penalty under Florida law for kidnaping is death in the electric chair.

The farm youth testified in a teary fashion where elaborate precautions had been taken to prevent the possibility of mob violence. Heavy police guards were stationed in and around the court.

Blackmail Case of Jesse A. Knabb Is Slated for June 27

Mayor Jesse A. Knabb will come to trial on blackmail charges on June 27 in Kitsap county superior court, the case being postponed from the June 20th hearing. A visiting judge to hear the action could not be obtained for the scheduled June 20th hearing.

Knabb will be tried alone under terms of the new information filed against the mayor in connection with the alleged blackmail, with charges he attempted to extort \$5,000 from Edward Bremer on threats to expose alleged illicit relations between the latter and his fiancée.

Earle Carter, also charged in connection with the alleged blackmail, will not come to trial until the fall jury term of court, it was revealed today.
