## Light An Inside Picture Of Financial and Political America

**WASHINGTON**—Railroads of the U. S. will get their best break in 20 years from the rehabilitation program President Roosevelt's transportation experts are framing for the next congress. It will be their reward for calling off the proposed wage cuts on the eve of the recent election.

Although only a few lines need loans, Jesse P. Jones will moderate them with money at extremely low rates of interest. Many laws will be revised so that reorganization moves may start in circuit instead of district court, reducing the wringing-out process from many years to a few months. If all works out as Mr. Jones promises. The government, through the R. F. C. will become the long-time financial manager of the railroads. Besides reducing fixed charges, the substitution of the plan for the present one, and the industry's bankers may get the roads from the field of partisan and demagogic politics. It won't be so popular to attack the railroads as the taxpayers are putting up the dough.

The far-reaching reform contemplates stripping the I. C. C. of its supreme authority over rates and to be transferred to the congress of last and final resort to an advisory agency. Underlying the reform is a plan to shift the rate structure, allowing the roads to charge enough to pay all costs and yield a reasonable profit.

**FADING**—The most influential backstage group which Washington has witnessed since the days of Andrew Jackson's kitchen cabinet is now disintegrating. It may mean the breakup of the whole brain trust group.

**RESTRAINT**—Although it costs the taxpayers more than \$500,000, the federal communications commission report on the investigation has been effectively bottled up by Chairman Francis B. Rowland. Oddly enough, he suppressed this blast from the White House in order to keep the public in the dark about the recovery parade—to impair their usefulness in any future defense program. It is, although they had been scheduled as No. 1 victims in the anti-monopoly crusade, they remained unwatched except for a personal rebuke from Commissioner Paul Walker.

## To 'Exile' CITIZENS JOIN IN OBSERVANCE OF ARMISTICE DAY

**Capt. Hewitt Tells 'Practical Way' to Keep Peace**

At 11 o'clock this morning, residents of Bremerton stood in silence, recalling a historic hour 20 years ago when soldiers of warring nations laid down arms and the Armistice began.

To observe this Armistice Day, residents were called from their homes by an 11-blast salute of the fire whistle to view a parade by maintaining an observance of the joint veterans' Armistice Day committee. Charles Deemer was chairman.

The memorial service was held at the navy yard gate before a large assemblage of veterans and others. Capt. H. Kent Hewitt, in person, presided in charge of the naval ammunition depot and delivered an inspiring address on peace.

Types of Pacifists

He told the audience that there were two types of pacifists—the idealistic and the practical. The latter, he said, believed the nation should be so strong that no other nation would dare to infringe on our rights.

The idealistic type of peace, Hewitt said, had exchanged the gun for the plow—laurel in theory, but did not work in practice. The former Princess Marina of Greece, leader of London's flower parade, wagging tongues for the move to jealousy of Queen Elizabeth.

## NAVY 'SECRET' FILMS STOLEN

**BOSTON, Nov. 10.**—(UP)—A motion picture of U. S. navy construction and battle maneuver exercises was stolen from a recruiting officer's automobile early today, he reported to police.

"Police found numerous fingerprints on the car and attributed the theft to boys."

Four cans containing 1,600 feet of film were stolen from the automobile of Machinist's Mate Timothy A. Dunning, parked outside Boston Harbor while he was attending a ball. Three of the cans contained trapezoidal film, Dunning said. The fourth reel, regarded as "confidential," depicted battle maneuvers, ship construction and design and types of gun mounting and casting.

This film was shown only before army and navy officers and was not open to the public. Dunning's camera and navy credentials also were taken, he said.
