Light An Inside Picture Of Financial and Political America

WASHINGTON... President Roosevelt has given several post-election visitors a novel and ingenious explanation for the voters' slaughter of Democratic candidates in key states on Nov. 8. His dissatisfaction with some of the men and machines on which he depended for two presidential triumphs is evident between the lines.

In F. D. R.'s opinion, losses in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Jersey, Ohio and Indiana were suffered because of popular resentment against the aims of the New Deal ticket of their professional backers. The voters, he insisted, were intent on repudiating James C. Murphy's administration, a partially corrupt Democratic administration in Connecticut, condemning Frank Hague's ruthless rule in New Jersey. In Ohio, he thought, they were rebelling against the aims of the Davey crowd, while in the Hoosier state they were taking a pot shot at Al McMillan's heirs and retainers.

Local policies and personalities influenced the voters far more than the national machine. The administration at Washington, in the president's belief, "with what little character it has left," is being vindicated by a substantial majority.

ROOSEVELT... Roosevelt forswore the dilemma he will face in all measures to elect a man of his choice to the White House. He challenges even his conceded ingenuity.

He will need the support of the municipal machines—Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Indianapolis, etc.—if he expects to dominate the convention and win at the national senatorial conference figured after this illuminating survey that F. D. R.'s 1938 majority would have been sliced in half—or thereabouts.
