## Draft-Age Men to Register In Yard; Need More Clerks

Men of conscription age who are employed in Puget Sound navy yard will be registered at special booths inside the yard Oct. 16. County Auditor Edgar D. Smith said today. Approximately 3,000 men between 21 and 35 years of age, inclusive, are employed in P. S. N. Y.

To handle the registration, advance committee, placed other appeals for additional volunteer workers, men and women. Approximately 100 to 200 registration clerks will be working in the navy yard alone, according to Smith. An additional 175 clerks will be needed to preside at polling places throughout the county on registration day.

## CITY CONSIDERS 2 DOCK LEASES

Two leases presented the city by the Bremer Estate in connection with the latter's facilities for rental of two city blocks were reviewed before the city commission this morning by James W. Bryan Jr., city attorney.

The other lease is drawn between Mrs. Sophia Bremer and the city and provides that the city rent from the Bremer for \$1 per month a certain waterfront area to be developed by construction of a sea wall and fill on which the city is to relieve parking congestion.

After reviewing the leases, Bryan stated that it was his personal opinion the dock-leasing proposal was "a very poor deal" for the city. Bryan is asking that he investigate legality of the leases. The city commission asked him to give them his personal opinion.

## 2 FRENCH HOSPITALS HIT IN BOMB RAIDS

Britain and Rumania May Break Diplomatic Relations

By JOE ALEX MORRIS, U. S. Foreign News Editor. Furious diplomatic activity today coincided with the steady hammering blows of British and German bombing planes against enemy objectives.

Great Britain, angered by the entry of German troops into Rumania and unable to get an embargo on the Rumanian government, was reported almost certain to break off diplomatic relations with the little oil-producing Balkan state.

In London, one bomb destroyed a big section of a hospital, apparently inflicting heavy toll of lives. The second hospital damaged was the one which was attacked. Another bomb rained through an air raid shelter in London, but no casualties were reported.

## 2 HOSPITALS HIT

Two hospitals in an air raid shelter were bombed during 24 hours of aerial attack on Britain. Nazi warplanes smashed with bombs and machine guns at streets in London and other cities where the wreckage of buildings, hospitals and homes was piled high in the presence of Soviet Premier Vicheslav Molotov—better understanding between the two powers.

## Strikes Naval Bases

The heavy all-night attacks on Britain were echoed by the crash of British bombs in Germany, where the London air ministry said that great damage had been inflicted on the naval bases at Bremen and Wilhelmshaven and the invasion ports along the English Channel.
