LONDON, Oct. 19.—(UP)—The ministry of home security said today that 6,554 German bombs were dropped, 10,615 seriously wounded in the German air attack during September.

Prime Minister Winston Churchill told the house of commons today that civilian air raid casualties from the start of the war to Oct. 18 were 10,615 and 10,615 wounded seriously during September.

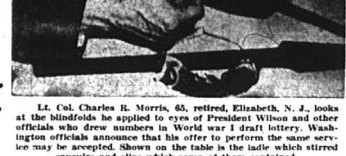

WILKIE AIMS TO 'FALSIFY' ISSUES—F. D.

President Says He'll Reply to Opponent in Five Talks

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—(UP)—President Roosevelt charged today that his public opponent, Wendell L. Wilkie, is systematically falsifying the issues in the coming campaign.

Without mentioning Wilkie by name, Mr. Roosevelt asserted a press conference that his opponent is falsifying major issues in a manner which is deliberate rather than unwitting.

He recalled that in his July 19 address accepting the third term nomination, he told the Democratic convention that he would have neither the time nor the inclination to engage in political activities. But in that same address, he recalled, he promised to reply to any "deliberate or unwitting falsification of fact."

His trips to make the address, Mr. Roosevelt said, will include inspection tours of defense projects. He said that despite the semi-official character of such trips, he will have the Democratic committee pay the travel costs as a matter of courtesy.
