P. S. N. Y.—and the Draft

Some persons manifested surprise when navy war workers were included in the draft. Their view was that these men are already in vital defense jobs and would doubtfully be of more use where they are than in the army.

It was necessary, of course, under the sweeping provisions of the selective service act, to include all defense workers in the draft. The point we are making is that it isn't necessary that they be called up.

It would seem gross inefficiency to take draftable men from the navy yard and place them in the army. Their jobs here would have to be taken over by others unskilled in the particular work we do at Puget Sound navy yard.

Can yard workers be generally deferred? The answer to that question lies outside our realm or that of the local draft authorities.

To conscript defense workers, would cause needless confusion of much the same type which has been encountered by the red tape which involves some civil service regulations.

Down in the navy yard recently, a helper who had been employed there at least six months—well broke in, as it were—was discharged. The reason: the application which he filed and on which he had been called to work showed insufficient experience.

Another thing, how about the six months of experience gained between the time that man was hired and the day of his discharge?

It is such business as the above which retards the U. S. defense effort.

Initiative 141 Dangerous

Before going to the polls on Nov. 3rd thoughtful Kitsap county voters will do well to study Initiative No. 141, termed by its promoters "The Senior Citizens' Act."

The Fraternal Order of Eagles, which has consistently led the fight for old age pensions throughout the nation, is definitely opposed to Initiative No. 141.

For one thing, Initiative No. 141, if enacted, would cost the state about 20 million dollars per year more than the present appropriations for pensions.

Washington's pension program has been developing orderly and steadily, with the Eagles lodge as an able adviser. The Eagles' insistence that Initiative No. 141 is NOT a proper act should be heeded by the voters.
