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We Need Street Signs

If Bremerton has a reputation as a hick town, probably the biggest single reason is the lack of street signs. Nearly every newcomer to the city remarks about the same thing—the difficulty of locating a given street or finding out what street you're traversing at a given moment.

Many of the newly-completed streets, in addition to those in the Daly and Snyder districts recently annexed by the city, lack sufficient identifying signs.

Our 4,500,000 Aliens

The census of aliens being completed, the U. S. can now take stock of the problem of the non-citizen among us. The total enrollment is expected to exceed 4,500,000. That means that one person in 28 in this country is an alien.

First, a caution: The official's charge of this registration disagree with the first stressed fact that there is nothing disgraceful or discreditable about alien status.

Director Harrison has also warned officials, employers and others who may now be tempted to demand that aliens produce evidence of having registered.

The enforcement of this registration act is a federal matter, through the department of justice. While this department may later on request certain local co-operation in identifying those who have failed to register.

Many, perhaps a majority of these registered aliens are on the road to becoming American citizens just as fast as the laws allow. Others will have matters to straighten out with the department of justice connected with illegal entry.

The task of winning these individuals out of the 5,000,000 is distinctly a professional task—one that belongs both by law and by common sense to trained operatives of the department of justice.

Help, cooperation and sympathy will serve the vast majority of these aliens far better than hounding. In this serving them, we shall best serve our common country.
