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## Huge Sum To Be Spent in District

Expenditure of nearly \$7,000,000 at Puget Sound navy yard was recommended in the national budget submitted to congress by President Roosevelt today.

P. S. N. Y. budget items were listed as follows: Additional pier and facilities, \$2,400,000; storehouse and accessories, \$1,400,000; relocation and improvement of shops, \$250,000; land purchase, \$90,000; improvement of waterfront, \$825,000; supply pier and accessories, \$850,000; replace radio laboratory, gyroscopes and instrument shop building, \$350,000; accessory construction and services for drydock No. 5, \$540,000; galley and mess hall wing at Puget Sound hospital, \$250,000. These totaled \$4,855,000.

Also included in proposed Washington expenditures for fiscal year 1942 were: Puget Sound naval ammunition depot—smokeless powder magazines, \$78,000; pyrotechnic magazine, \$30,000; fuse magazine, \$4,000. Keyport naval torpedo station—extension of building 76, \$83,000; additional oil storage for power plant, \$15,000. Seattle naval aviation station—extension of roads, walks and paving, \$50,000. These totaled \$207,000.

California navy projects were marked for \$17,126,000, including \$8,500,000 for supply depot at Oakland; Alaska projects, \$2,801,700 and Nevada, \$1,995,000.

Allen's bill would put congress on record as regarding Bridges' presence in the U. S. as "unjustified."

The house passed a similar bill sponsored by Allen last June 13 by a vote of 330 to 42, but it was not acted upon by the senate immigration committee.

## ADMIRAL KNOX APPOINTED AS NEW 'CINCPAC'

Three-Fleet Force Is Ordered; Personnel Will Be Boosted

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(UP)—President Roosevelt today directed a sweeping reorganization of the U. S. fleet and ordered each warship to be manned at full wartime strength.

Mr. Roosevelt also ordered a wholesale shakedown in the naval high command and authorized an increase in the active enlisted strength of the navy from 192,000 to 237,000 men. That will give each warship 100 per cent of wartime strength. The present complement is only 85 per cent.

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
