GREEK ROSES GET HEAD

Britain Reports New Italian Resistance to Be Stronger
LONDON, Jan. 28 (UP)—Free French raiders from Equatorial Africa have captured the Italian post of Gaurin, Libya, Gen. Charles De Gaulle's headquarters, said in a communique today.

Serious losses in men and materials were said by the French to have been inflicted on the Italians, and several enemy planes were destroyed on the ground. Gaurin is 100 miles southeast of Marak, which the French yesterday disclosed they had raided in a lightning attack from Chad.

Greece rallied today to carry on her war against Italy despite the death of her strong man, Premier Gen. Ioann Metaxas, while British military experts warned of the "very real" danger of invasion of the British Isles and the threat that the Nazi Luftwaffe might use Greece as a springboard for imperial forces into Libya.

Metaxas was succeeded by Alex. Averof, a non-political government bank expert, and there were some indications that the new government might exercise even more effectively than Metaxas. It was understood that his power by iron-handed methods and even with the outbreak of war against Italy had not provoked any serious suppression of all oppositionist groups.

STROGER RESISTANCE
There were indications both in Athens and London that the Archibald Wavell's imperial army had been ordered to meet the counter-attacking Italian resistance.

It was reported that the Italians appeared to be making a strong stand at Derina, that had been abandoned today, and that an unusually strong Fascist force had been sent to the town of Mekki, southwest of Derina, on the plateau road to Benghazi.

The British surrounded the town, but the hard-pressed Fascist Libyan troops were making every effort to speed their advance toward the town.

VERY REAL THREAT
The British military experts assessing Britain's military outlook continued to report that the Italian army was making every effort to speed their advance toward the town.

CLOSED SHOP BAIN BROUGHT VINSON'S BILL

Solon Would Outlaw Strikes in Naval Defense Plants
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (UP)—Chairman Carl Vinson of the house naval affairs committee today introduced legislation to ban the closed shop in plants working on defense contracts and to require mediation of all labor disputes in these plants.

Vinson offered the bill to apply particularly to "naval defense contractors," but the definition in the bill was broad enough to apply to every firm or industry in which the government was a member of any labor organization.

The measure would set up a naval defense labor board with duties similar to the railway mediation board. All labor disputes which might be referred to that board until the defense emergency is ended.
