Marguerite Clark of Stage Fame Is Dead NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—(UP)—Marguerite Clark, who 27 years ago deserted stardom on the stage and silent screen to become a wealthy southern society matron, died yesterday, she was 85.

Years before the World War armistice the name "Marguerite Clark" flashed up in downtown Broadway and on theater marquee across the country, but in 1918 she was married to Harry P. Williams, wealthy southern lumberman, sugar plantation owner and airplane manufacturer.

Mrs. Clark and Williams lived on their spacious plantation in St. Mary's Parish, La. On May 19, 1936, Williams was killed in an airplane crash near Baton Rouge.

Exemption Granted From Wage-Hour Act WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—(UP)—The wage-hour administration today classifies mining or placer tin in Alaska as a seasonal industry and granted it partial exemption from the maximum hours provisions of the fair labor standards act.
