Sharp Intra-Party Discord May Split the Republicans

BY UNITED PRESS The Republican party, plagued by a bitter intra-party feud every election since 1930, today faced a serious intra-party row. The Republicans' troubles focus upon their 1940 standard-bearer, Wendell L. Willkie, who opposes most of the party leaders and agrees with Democratic President Roosevelt. The battle lines were clearly drawn last night at a party dinner, celebrating the birthday of the Republican party's first president, the tribute to Abraham Lincoln were overshadowed by clear signs of discord. Notably missing among the noon-day speakers were former President Herbert Hoover and Alf M. Landon, 1936 G. O. P. standard-bearer. Both Hoover and Landon oppose the administration's British-aid program. Willkie, addressing a New York dinner and a nation-wide radio audience, challenged the party to preach a "positive doctrine," warned it against lapsing into a "party of negation," and left no doubt that he would fight, by any means, to strip him of his power as the No. 1 Republican leader. He criticized the New Deal, too, making clear that he was not in agreement with the Roosevelt administration still ends with questions of Britain and general foreign policy. But he told Roosevelt: "I am here to challenge you by a far more than compromise, negation and death."

WILLKIE CHALLENGED

While he was warning the party against isolation in a world at peace, Sen. Robert A. Taft, Rep. O. P. Sisson, opponent of the British-aid bill and an unsuccessful aspirant for the Republican nomination last summer, challenged Willkie's right to Republican leadership. Taft, speaking at Harrisonburg, Va., concluded that Willkie was a Republican leader, such as Mr. Hoover and Landon, but added: "There is no justification in precedent or principle for the view that a defeated candidate for president is the titular leader of the party. Willkie does not and cannot accept for the Republican party in the Republican party. He has to take a party position on foreign affairs, which it ought not do." Willkie's testimony before the senate committee considering the British-aid bill was that of an individual and he entitled to respect as such," he said. SILENT ON DISCORD There was no mention of Republican discord by other major speakers at dinners, but congressional votes on the British-aid bill stood as mute evidence of what may develop into the most serious party controversy since Theodore Roosevelt bolted the Republicans in 1912. Only 24 of the 150 house Republicans voted for the British-aid bill. There was general agreement
