 LIMA, Peru, Mar. 5.—(UP)—A total of 30 dead, many missing and hundreds of homeless were reported today from the flooded north central coastal regions of Peru. The swollen waters of the Paruro river in the Paruro mining district, swept away a workers camp and 16 persons, including a woman and three small children, were drowned.

140,000 Imprisoned
 ITALIANS IN LIBYA
 LONDON, Mar. 5.—(UP)—Carl David Margson, war secretary, said in a written reply in the house of commons today that latest information shows there now were about 140,000 Italian prisoners in Libya. He said there was no information on Italian casualties and that it was not desirable to give British casualties "even where, as in this case, they were exceptionally light."

Blockade to Blame For Bread Shortage
 WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—(UP)—Facing a fall famine and a shortage of all vital supplies, blamed the "crucial" British blockade today. A bread famine menace France despite a 20 per cent reduction in bread rations in both the occupied and unoccupied zones, a government spokesman said. He said the free zone now has only half enough wheat to carry the population to the next harvest, which will be below normal.
