6 U. S. Ships To Australia

WASHINGTON, March 17.—(UP)—The "good-will" visit of six American warships to Auckland, N. Z., was requested by British diplomatic sources today as a demonstration of friendship between the U. S. and Great Britain in the Far East.

The navy disclosed last night in a surprise announcement that two Navy minesweepers, the USS Antrim and four fast destroyers had been dispatched to Auckland from their base at Pearl Harbor for three-day visit.

The navy refused to reveal when the ships arrived at Auckland, but it was believed they had already arrived when the announcement was made here.

The navy said the purpose of the visit is for good will and recreation, and that the vessels would return to their normal operating base at Pearl Harbor either Tuesday night or Wednesday.

The detachment comprised the minesweepers USS Antrim and USS Savannah, both completed in 1928, and the destroyers USS Shaw, USS Cummings and USS Tucker, all 1,500-ton Mahan class, which were ordered to complete the voyage to the Hawaiian Islands, then to San Francisco, and then to Australia.

BRITISH ROSE MORE GRAND IN NORTH AFRICA

British Troops Now 'Mopping Up' in Desert Areas

Smashing new successes in Italian East Africa today freed Gen. Sir Archibald Wavell's army from concentration on the big new Bahari war front where a German British clash may develop at any time.

The new British blows virtually sealed the fate of Premier Benito Mussolini's East African empire, and the British appeared to be within striking distance of forcing the remaining Fascist garrisons to surrender or continue fighting against nearly hopeless odds.

IREN UNDER ATTACK

At the same time the hardy British and Indian troops were being sent to the Italian gateway to Amara in Italian Eritrea, another group of strategic light commandos captured a town and destroyed an African garrison.

The British already are nibbling away at Ethiopia from no fewer than 12 directions, with the most serious attacks coming from the northwest and, with native Ethiopian aid, rapidly moving toward the high plateau on which Addis Ababa lies.
