

Call Knox to Testify on Greer Incident

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—(UP)—Chairman David I. Walsh, Democrat, of the senate naval affairs committee said today that Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox would be asked to attend a hearing next week on resolutions to investigate the Greer incident.

The U. S. Greer, a destroyer, carrying mail to the Iceland station was attacked by a German submarine Sept. 4 near Iceland. The incident was reported by President Roosevelt last night in a radio address as evidence that Germany is attempting to wage unrestricted submarine warfare.

Walsh said no date has been set for the committee hearing but that it would be held either Wednesday or Thursday and that the crew of naval operations, Admiral Harold R. Stark, also would be asked to testify.

Two resolutions were introduced yesterday calling for investigation.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—(UP)—Stocks made an irregular advance in moderate trading today on favorable interpretation of President Roosevelt's speech.

Wall Street considered the speech as clearing uncertainty on our ship at sea. Since the president didn't mention Japan, the market community deduced that the administration was hoping for amicable settlement of Japanese-U. S. differences.

Stocks were firm early. They encountered some profit-taking that brought irregularity in the third hour and then resumed their upturn.

It was the first time the two dollar mark had been chalked up on the boards since the boom days of 1928, when May wheat sold at \$2.05.

Lindy Heckled As He Strikes At 'Agitators'

(DES MOINES, Iowa, Sept. 12.—(UP)—Charles A. Lindbergh asserted last night that a small minority of "agitators" led by the British, the Jewish and the Roosevelt administration, were using propaganda, money and patronage to push the nation into war.

The isolationist leader said the three groups "planned, first to prepare the United States for foreign war under the guise of American defense; second, to invite us in the war; step by step, without our realization; third, to create a series of incidents which would force us into the actual conflict."

Lindbergh addressed an audience of 6,000 at a meeting sponsored by the America First committee. The throng first heard President Roosevelt's address from Washington. It then greeted Lindbergh with applause, which mingled with whistles from the upper balcony of "Hitler" and "get your head out of the sand." Gallery hecklers shouted several times during Lindbergh's talk, but he took no notice of them.
