Just a few months ago, you will recall, we American people were being told by the spokesmen for this group that the opurse to pursue was to let the war come to an end, to help bring it to an end, to recognize and acknowledge "the wave of the future," and to make as advantageous a deal as we could with der fuehrer as to trade areas and the like.
Well, such as theory was based on the assumption that Hitler could, and would make a peace in Europe. But will

Hitler could, and would make a peace in Europe. But will he? Can he accomplish such an end? Today the answer seems very plain that he cannot. He can make war, that we all realize, but it now is apparent that he cannot make a peace. He has been unable to make a peace with France, with Norway, with the Czechs, the Poles, the Iggo-Slava, the Greeks or with anybody else his legions have

If he had made peace with France, he would have had to re-lease the prisoners. He dared not allow the young men of France to return home to a country which he had gutted. He would have had to withdraw his occuping forces. He dared not do his, knowing quite well what would happen to his agents and to the French collaborationists. Thus, he can never withdraw from con-quered territory without the certainty of the inhabitants turning tolently against him. This is the reason why the new order has not been established anywhere, though its advent has so often been rectainty.
