

### Uncle Sam Posts "Get Out" Sign for Aliens

Issued by headquarters of the fourth army in San Francisco, this map designated Pacific coast zones in which aliens will be prohibited or restricted. Overall area is designated as Military Area No. 1 with the shaded shading portion indicating Prohibited Zone A-1 and dotted Area Zone B. While no immediate evacuation order was issued, Lt. Gen. DeWitt suggested all Japanese—alien and American-borne—might do well to get out of Area 1 as quickly as possible.

### TODAY'S MARKETS

**STOCK MARKET**  
NEW YORK—A sharp break running to 8 points in utility shares and a number of special issues featured a general decline on the stock market today.

The utility average sank 3 3/8 per cent to a new record low since the average was started in 1929. The industrial average made a new four-year low. The railroad average was within a fraction of the low for the year made on January 2. Trading increased on the decline.

United States rubber went down 7 points to a new low, but rallied slightly. Other tire issues were down fractionally.

### Arguments in Illingworth Trial Started

PORT ANGELES, March 5. — (UP)—Attorneys began final arguments today in the trial of Monty J. Illingworth, Long Beach, Cal., former brewery truck driver accused of first degree murder in the "Lady of the Lake" slaying of his wife in 1937.

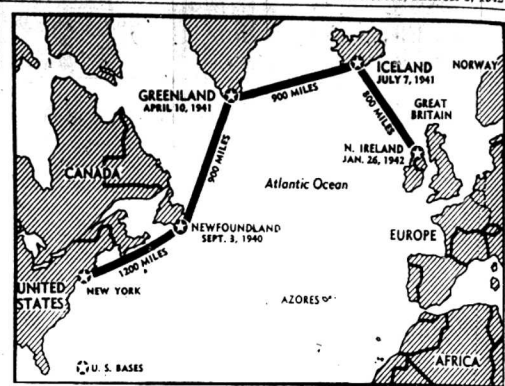
Three Seattle pathologists yesterday denied testimony of two expert state witnesses that the body of the 33-year-old woman, found in the summer of 1940 floating in the icy waters of nearby Lake Crescent, could have been preserved 31 months in the lake without becoming a skeleton.

Dr. Alfred L. Balle denied that desiccation described as a cold water hardening process, lignifies substances and makes them float, but on the contrary would increase the weight of a body. He estimated from pictures of the Lake Crescent body that it could not have been in the water more than six months.

If the body had been in the lake 31 months it would have been eaten by fish, Dr. D. H. Nickerson testified.

Dr. Carl Wilson criticized lack of details in the post mortem.
