

### Would Take 10 Per. From All Paychecks

(Continued From Page 1) We explained that the growing danger of inflation has caused the treasury to decide to ask for a flat 10 per cent withholding tax. Withholding is a method of collecting the income levy, an additional tax for the collection of part of the income tax at source on bond interest and dividends, as well as on salaries and wages. Employers would be held responsible for collecting the withholding tax and paying it to the government as they are for social security payments.

The committee's decision on income tax rates will be announced late yesterday. It will bring an additional \$2,750,000 into the treasury. For Americans starting up to \$10,000, whether of net tax withholding is 1945 will be a fact of reckoning. If it never was adopted, the figure would have risen to \$3,000.

For those with children and an income of \$3,000 would pay \$306 under the new rates. This year it paid \$138. These figures do not take into account deductions that the taxpayer might be able to make for contributions, interest, etc.

For those with a \$3,000 income and two children would pay \$482. This year it paid \$216. It will cost a single person with no dependents \$447 to raise the child. The committee also has finally adopted by the house and senate. This year such a taxpayer paid \$221.

**Oregon Japs Leave Work For Fields**

Although the Nyssa camp is the only camp approved to date, several other camps are being considered. Walter J. Duffy, FSA regional director, announced.

**LIQUOR SALES INCREASE**  
OLYMPIA, May 21 (UP)—Liquor sales at state stores during April totaled \$1,346,985, the highest since 1939. This compares with \$1,641,349 in 1941. The increase is due to the fact that the figure is considerably below the 1939-41 sales of December.

(Continued From Page 1) Military observers report that in eastern China, where heavy fighting continues, the Chinese are fighting in Yunnan province. Chinese report re-capture of Kanchow on Burma border.  
Barma—British airplanes again bomb Japanese in Chindwin river sector and near Akvay on west coast of Burma.  
Middle East—Allied planes blast Kopsang and Dill on Thibor Island, destroying two Japanese planes starting from the island.  
France—R.A.F. renews daylight attacks on Cherbourg and Le Havre sector of German-held coast.  
Mediterranean—R.A.F. bombs Axis convoy, hitting medium-sized merchant ships. Also attacks naval bases and shipping lanes.

PORTO ALLEGRO, Brazil, May 21 (UP)—At least 30 towns in southern Rio Grande do Sul State were flooded today by torrential rains that hit the Giba, Tapajua and Jacui rivers out of their banks.

**Jap Ship Hits Mine**  
SAN FRANCISCO, May 21 (UP)—Chungking radio said today a Japanese steamship headed westward on the Yangtze river struck a mine and blew up. The broadcast, recorded in Chungking, said the sinking occurred at Tungling in Anhwei.

packing coats from her former home to Bremerton were paid by naval authorities, as in many cases, and now she is to be left homeless with her children, with not enough money to cover moving costs, but alone a home to move to. Another Westpark resident since December, quarts, "They took care of the Japs, why don't they take care of us?"  
Though naval and Bremerton housing authorities realize the full import of the situation and the effect it might have on the navy men's morale, it was emphasized that the action is vitally necessary.

**Wall of Storage Plant Collapses at Fairfield; 2 Dead**  
FAIRFIELD, Wash., May 21 (UP)—Two men were killed today when a wall in the wheat storage plant of the Centennial Flouring Mills at Fairfield collapsed grain.  
The dead were Lt. S. Saver, 65 and Floyd Runion, 36, both of Fairfield.  
Fellow workers reported the pair had just emptied one storage bin when they were preparing to go out another when the partition gave way.  
Rescue squads dug frantically to save them but they were buried for more than an hour and initial efforts were unsuccessful.  
**Unions Given Right To Inspect Records**  
OLYMPIA, May 21 (UP)—Labor unions can inspect state health department records on receipts and expenditures of tax-exempt hospitals in the state. Attorney General Smith Troy ruled today.  
Health Director Donald G. Evans advised him the unions wanted to inspect the records to help obtain wage rates for non-professional hospital employees. They also wanted to check up on social security and unemployment compensation benefits for such employees.  
Troy said such records were public so long as the person inspecting them was not doing so out of mere curiosity or trying to create a scandal.

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**F.D.R. Should Be 'Dictator,' Says Hoover**  
NEW YORK, May 21 (UP)—Herbert Hoover urged last night that President Roosevelt be given "dictatorial economic power" to win the war.  
"There must be no personal liberty anywhere if we lose the war," Hoover said in a nationwide broadcast.  
"To win total war President Roosevelt must have dictatorial economic power. There must be no hesitation in giving them to him and upholding him in them."  
"Moreover, we must expect a steady decrease in economic freedom as the war goes on."  
"We must start our thinking with a disingenuous cold, hard measure necessary to win total war. Hoover recommended a three-point program for winning both the war and the peace: 1. Establishment of a national war council, embracing civilian heads of war agencies, to act directly with the president as many times a weak cabinet economics. 2. Preparedness by "organized objective research and public debate" for post-war reconstruction. 3. Preparedness for the "peace" making.
