Garments completed during the year that will go overseas include the following: 51 complete layettes, 167 knitted garments, 75 sewing garments, such as pajamas and hospital gowns, 14 knitted scarves and bonnets, 228 baby garments from two groups of Port Orchard seamstresses.

The statistics look very nice in black and white but they can't tell the story of the year that will go overseas. The various fund-raising methods these gallant Bremerton women have employed their work is symbolic of the dog-like courage and determination of the whole British people.

The army prepared today to hasten the evacuation of Japanese from the Pacific northwest, with issuance of five more exclusion orders for removal of Japanese from 14 Oregon and 16 Washington counties within military zones.

These Japanese will be evacuated to reception camps established in the United States. The orders, Nos. 87 and 91, inclusive, involved the following counties in that state: Pacific, Wahkiakum, Cowlitz, Clark, Skamania, Lewis, Mason, Grays Harbor, Thurston, Clallam, Jefferson, Whatcom, Skagit, Snohomish, Island, and portions of Pierce, Kitsap, and Kitsap county.

Photograph of a tall silver trophy is causing the grief of Mrs. Elizabeth Kinney, 2707 8th st. S.W. The photograph, reproduced herewith, arrived the other day from the office of the U.S.S. Arizona, first line battleship destroyed in the Japanese attack on Dec. 7. It was on the ship that Mrs. Kinney's husband, Frederick Kinney, first musician, U.S.N., was killed with other members of his band as he was passing ammunition to fight off the enemy planes.

Pooling of All Transport Services Due

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(UP)—The office of defense transportation today perfected plans for pooling of all transport services in the nation, including a streamlined, war-time transportation policy as possible solutions to the critical fuel shortage.

The rationing proposal, under study for the past week, is expected to be submitted to the war production board on Tuesday for their approval. Key points in the transportation program would be pooling of existing facilities—buses, trucks and railroads—and elimination of unneeded or duplicating services.

The DOT order yesterday directed four bus lines operating between New York and Washington to pool their services interchangeably with the nation's other railroads. The pooling was expected to set the pattern for future transportation orders.

Officials printed out that 5,000 miles a day was stated through duplicating services on the four lines.
