Japs to 'Move In' on Soviet Wallgren

BELLINGHAM, B.C., July 13.—(UP)—The loss of Alouette outposts might prevent the U. S. from sending assistance to Russia in event Japan attacks her. Sen. Mon C. Wallgren, Dem., Wash. told Democrats attending a state convention Saturday.

Wallgren said he "strongly believes Japan would not declare war on Russia."
"They'll just move in and their occupation of one or two islands in the Aleutians may prevent us from assisting the Russians," he said.
The senate sub-committee of which Wallgren is a member will inspect Alaskan army posts and the Aleutians in August. The convention was adjourned after electing Tom Smith, King county commissioner, as permanent chairman, and adopting resolutions approving the president's attitude toward the axis.
Resolutions calling for "down the line" support of Mr. Roosevelt were enacted by the delegates following the uncheduled appearance of Wallgren, who called for "harmony and unity" within party ranks and defeat of both Republican and Democratic office holders who had not supported the president.

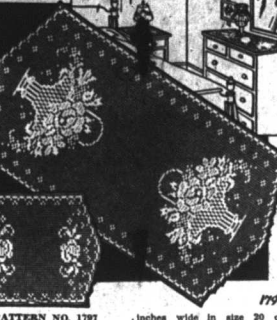
Kidnaped From Hospital, Lynched

Unified War Command for Alaska Urged

WASHINGTON, July 13.—(UP)—Alaskan civilian officials are urging President Roosevelt to establish a unified army-navy command in Alaska, it was learned today.
Alaska is the only remaining major outpost under independent army and navy commands. The recommendations for unification, it was said, were not the result of any feeling that Japanese success in establishing footholds in the Aleutian islands was due to failure of either the army or navy commands. Rather they were said to have been emphasized because of anticipation of new Japanese attacks and maneuvers in the area.

Navy Evacuates 32 From Dutch Harbor

SEATTLE, July 13.—(UP)—The 11th naval district announced the arrival of a navy transport yesterday from Dutch Harbor and Unalaska, bringing 32 evacuees, including two wounded in the Japanese bombing June 3.

Most of the passengers were native women and children and construction workers. Most non-essential civilians and wounded military personnel arrived in Seattle earlier, the first contingent docking June 20.
Seaplane Tender Launched at Yard
SEATTLE, July 13.—(UP)—The seaplane tender Half Moon was launched at the Houghton Lake Washington shipyard yesterday. Mrs. T. A. Gray, wife of a naval inspector at the Boeing Aircraft Co., was sponsor.
The Tacoma plant of the Seattle-Tacoma Shipbuilding Corp. Thursday will launch a 17,600-ton aircraft escort vessel, the Ravager, which will be turned over to the British navy upon completion.

Soldier Gets Term; Officer Must Repay \$5,000 Stolen Fund

SEATTLE, July 13.—(UP)—Harry C. Savage, 35, today began a 10-year sentence in Mead Island penitentiary for absconding with a \$4,000 army payroll and an army jeep March 10.
Savage, whose home is in Richfield, N. Y., pleaded guilty and was sentenced by U. S. District Judge John C. Brown.
Assistant U. S. Attorney Allan Fommery told the court that as a result of Savage's act the federal immediate superior officer, Second Lieut. R. I. Cummings, Buffalo, N. Y., had been found guilty by courtmartial on a charge of dereliction of duty and was ordered to make restitution to the government of \$5,000 of the payroll which Savage spent in San Francisco, Omaha, Chicago and Rochester.
