

Crooner Says Arrof Offered To Pay for Car

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5 (UP)—Roy Martin, suddenly remembering a long-forgotten conversation, revealed some of his earlier testimony today and told a general court martial that Lt. Comdr. Maurice N. Arrof once offered payment for Martin's Studebaker automobile.

Martin, the Hollywood singer who claimed the navy as a chief suspect, was the first witness in defense of Arrof in the court-martial with "suspicious conduct." Among other things, Arrof is accused of accepting Martin's car as a gift for "facilitating" Martin's entrance into the navy.

As a prosecution witness, Martin told the court martial he gave the car to Arrof in a burst of generosity and that Arrof never offered to pay for it, but that morning after a sleepless night, Martin testified he was recalled that Arrof once told him:

"You've been nice enough to let me use the car, so I thought I'll deduct \$200 (rented by Arrof in 1941) deduct \$100 (rented by Arrof) and then give you the rest."

Martin acknowledged on the stand his memory had been "slightly refreshed," but only by naval intelligence officers—not by defense attorneys.

entrances to buildings shall not exceed one foot candle at any point. Light from industrial operations, such as the Puget Sound navy yard, will be shielded or restricted as much as practicable. It was announced.

Highway signs and signals will be shielded so that no light emanates upward. It was announced today that street highway lights in and around Bremerton would be affected. These lights, when visible from the sea, will be shielded, but it was announced that in areas such as Bremerton, they would be governed and controlled by such subsequent orders or proclamations as the exigencies of military necessity may determine.

Civilian defense organizations are expected to aid in working out necessary enforcement procedure to comply with DeWitt's order. Gov. Arthur B. Langlie has instructed the state defense council to cooperate.

Persons in doubt as to how the dimout would affect them were advised to obtain copies of the proclamation, giving full details of the regulations from postoffice, gasoline service stations, civilian defense offices and their block air raid wardens.

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Japs to Move From Puyallup To New Camps

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5 (UP)—Two new relocation centers have been opened near Oyster Bay, and Eden Isiah, to quickly evacuated Pacific coast Japanese for the duration of the war. Col. Chas. B. Buckwalter, assistant director of staff of the western defense command announced today.

Approximately 12,000 evacuees will be transferred from temporary camps at Puyallup, Wash., and Pomona, Calif., to the new relocation centers at Oyster Bay and Eden Isiah.

Movements of the Japanese to the new centers will start on or about Aug. 8. No more than 600 evacuees will be transferred by train daily until the movements are completed. Col. Buckwalter said.

Truck gardening will be continued to subsidize for the center.

STOCK MARKET—Investment German securities on the Russian lines brought decidedly better stocks today. Trading generally was dull. Stocks were up 1/2 to 1 point. The industrial stock average broke below 100 for the first time since July 2. All major sections followed the decline, including stocks, bonds, oil, automobile, aircraft and the grain.

Merchants shares had small declines. Stocks generally were easier. All lines lost as much as 1/2 to 1 point.

Pvt. Philip Y. Downing, Austin, Tex., and Pvt. Benedict M. Street of Tupon, Kan., were critically injured.

Hit-Run Trial Set Thursday Morning—Trial of Eugene Tiffany, 60, Port Orchard, R. I., charged with the hit-and-run driving, has been set in police court for Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

Loaded Bus Hit by Train; Eight Killed

JACKSON, Miss., Aug. 5 (UP)—At least eight persons were killed and many injured today as an Illinois Central passenger train and a Greyhound bus collided at Crystal Springs, 23 miles south of here, the state highway police announced.

The highway police quoted the conductor of the train as saying that eight bodies had been recovered from the wreckage of the bus.

The accident occurred about noon, at the grade crossing at Crystal Springs. State police said the bus was carrying about 30 passengers.

Patriot Army Scores Victory In Jugoslavia

LONDON, Aug. 5 (UP)—Gen. Draza Mihailovich's patriot army has today won a major battle in the Bosnian area of west-central Yugoslavia, the British army announced today.

It reported that after capturing the towns of Proser and Gorazde in the Vrbas river area, the patriot guerrillas were continuing their progress northward along the river toward the important railroad line near Jajce and Travnik, 160 miles west of Belgrade.

Fighting was heavy throughout the region, the communique said. No longer was a quarter of merely defending the rich oil centers and communications of the austrians because much of the oil already has been cut off by the patriot army and important stretches of the railroad lines have been severed.

It was a battle to keep Marshal Bonyon Thomsen's army in the field and prevent them from being broken into segments and ground beneath the charge of fleets of German tanks—driving forward in some places at the rate of 50 miles a day and picking up German planes which are almost ideal for this mountainous terrain.

CONSTANT ATTACK—The Germans were exerting full strength to smash forward in the side units of tommy-guns and anti-aircraft attacking in upon the Red army almost constantly in waves of 50 and 60.

The British air force resumed its night attacks on German industrial centers, striking at the Ruhr with heavy bombers but apparently in comparatively light force since only one bomber and one fighter were lost.

A tense situation existed in India and in Britain—as Mohandas K. Gandhi and his followers of the all-India national congress gathered in Bombay for Friday's meeting which will act on Gandhi's resolution calling for a civil disobedience campaign throughout India in support of demands for complete and immediate independence.
