NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(UP)—Eight officers and enlisted men of the U. S. cruiser, Mattheus, have been awarded the navy cross for heroism during the bombing of their ship in the south Pacific, last Feb. 10.

Rear Admiral E. J. Marquart, commander of the third naval district, conferred the cross at a private ceremony Saturday in the Brooklyn navy yard.

U.S. Fleet Repulsed In North, Say Japs

TOKYO, Aug. 10.—(UP)—Japanese broadcast recorded by RIF in San Francisco—Imperial headquarters announced today Japanese naval forces in Aleutian waters on Aug. 5 successfully repulsed strong enemy forces which appeared for battle.

The announcement said the action "successfully demonstrated success of Japanese naval forces in the northern Pacific waters as well as in the south."

(The U. S. has announced the bombardment of Japanese installations on Kiska Island in the Aleutians.)

Trio Arrested For Kidnaping And Assault

OLYMPIA, Aug. 10.—(UP)—Three, Fort Lewis soldiers were held in Thurston county jail today in connection with the kidnaping and assault of a 31-year-old Chehalis widow Friday night.

Prosecutor John S. Lynch, Jr., said Pvt. James Laggett of Brookhaven, Wash., was arrested Saturday night. Two others, Pvt. Roy Trombley of Detroit, Mich., and Glen Staley of Grays Harbor, Ia., were arrested yesterday.

Lynch said he would file formal charges accusing the trio of first degree kidnaping and assault. The charges carry the death penalty in Washington state.

Lynch said the woman told him Laggett and two companions approached her in downtown Olympia Friday night and asked for a ride in her car. After they were seated, they ordered her to drive to Grand Mound. As they neared the town, Lynch said, one of the soldiers claimed to be ill and as-

ked the woman to stop the car. The woman asserted she was attacked when one soldier stepped from the auto. She said the three soldiers returned and forced the assault. Later they forced her from the vehicle and drove away, she said.

Lynch said the victim made her way to a highway and a motorist took her to Chehalis for treatment. Lynch said a hat found at the scene of the incident was identified as belonging to Laggett.

The crime was the second of a similar nature committed here recently. Jack Marable was kidnaped and Robert Kinnick given 60 years in prison for forcing an Olympia mother to drive to Grand Mound at the point of a knife. They were convicted of kidnaping and rape.

Trombley and Staley admitted participating in the affair and had implicated Laggett, Lynch said, and the woman "positively identified" Laggett as one of her assailants.

Flash Floods Cause Ruin in Pennsylvania

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 10.—(UP)—The death toll in flash floods in Bucks, Montgomery, Lancaster and Chester counties stood today at two, and the property damage was estimated at more than \$1,000,000.

Heavy rains Saturday and early yesterday morning sent walls of water down choked creek beds, flooded homes and industrial plants, upset trees and scattered thousands of acres of farmland. More than 300 families were evacuated from their homes between Collegedale and Parkersburg.

Liberty Ships to Be Complete in 35 Days, Claim

PORTLAND, Aug. 10.—(UP)—A new specially constructed assembly plant now in operation, will enable Oregon Shipbuilding Corp. to complete 10,500-ton Liberty ships in an all-time record of 35 days or less, officials disclosed today.

The plant, added as an afterthought to speed-up production was constructed at a cost of \$2,500,000. Its purpose is to eliminate bottlenecks caused by direct transport of steel plate and small assemblies from the plate shop to the ways. It was disclosed.

Operation of the new plant will cut from two to three weeks off the present rate of production per ship.
