### New-Type Glass Seen as Boon to Aircraft Industry

TOKYO, Oct. 2. (UP)—The war is bringing new developments in glass which will influence the manufacture of future automobiles, trains, airplanes and the home, John D. Biggers, president of the Libby-Owens-Ford Glass Co., said yesterday. Biggers demonstrated the most significant war development in glass—multiflex—in a group of newspaper women on a tour of the nation's war industries. The new product, designed for use in streamliner planes, can withstand the terrific pressure of high altitudes.

Built in sandwiched layers of glass and transparent plastic sheet, multiflex has a metal and plastic flange which permits it to be attached to a plane in such a manner that the glass will not tear loose from the body under pressure.

Biggers said multiflex seals the plane, thus eliminating the need

### Chinese Army Wins Battle On Malaria

By ROBERT F. MARTIN CHUNGKING, Sept. 2. (UP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek's army of the northwest has won the battle of disease in Yunnan province, known as the world's worst malaria region, it was disclosed today.

Additionally the army in Yunnan has developed an excellent intelligence-guerrilla system which keeps the Japanese troops in northern Burma under constant surveillance. Possibility of a surprise Japanese attack across the Salween river into Yunnan has been reduced to a minimum.

Dr. Robert McClure, Toronto, Canada, who heads the Friends Ambulance Unit in China, told the United Press that the central army is stationed in the southwest is of special oxygen tanks for its occupants.

### Chinese Fighting Group in China

Dr. McClure completed an 11-day tour of the Salween Front—dividing line between the Japanese and Chinese forces and high-water mark of the Japanese advance northward through Burma. Dr. McClure said that while the Chinese Red Cross, the army medical administration and volunteer units have helped the malaria problem for the Chinese, the Japanese still are suffering before the epidemic "disease" in Yunnan, 21 out of 30 Chinese soldiers in one battalion died within two weeks; 27 died in one company, four out of six coxles died in one week. Malaria, food poisoning—including poisonous mushrooms—and cholera accounted for the heavy toll of death.

The army medical service went into action, providing quinine, ginger tea, fresh fruit and vegetables, salt and medical supplies for the soldiers. In one area the army vaccinated 10,000 civilians and in another 8,000.

As a result cholera and malaria deaths have been reduced to "title or nothing" among the Chinese soldiers, and sickness result-

### Idaho Farmers to Hire Jap Evacuees

BOISE, Idaho, Sept. 2. (UP)—Southern Idaho farmers were organizing in small "employer groups" today to qualify for hiring of Japanese laborers from the Minidoka relocation center beginning next week.

The U. S. employment service said farmers must unite in groups of not less than three to qualify as employers of Japanese labor, which "has now arrived in sufficient numbers to supply part of the early demand." A new procedure for hiring Japanese evacuated from the coast requires "employer groups" to guarantee work and working conditions and pay for transportation up to 200 miles.

### Japanese Interest In 30 Firms Taken Into U.S. Custody

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2. (UP)—Allen Property Custodian Leo T. Crowley announced yesterday seizure of Japanese interests in 30 American companies, most of whom are engaged in the official-export trade.

Crowley said the companies best known in the U.S. were Mitsubishi and Co., and Mitsubishi Shoji Kaisha, American subsidiaries of two powerful Japanese concerns which exported raw materials from the U.S. The list included the following companies: Kawasaki Kioku Kaisha, Ltd., New York City; San Francisco and Seattle; Wash. Kawakaki Kōsan Kabushiki Kaisha, Ltd., New York City, San Francisco and Seattle; Mitsubishi Ship Kaisha, Ltd., New York City, San Francisco, and Seattle.

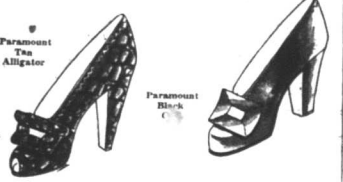
### Four-Day Strike at Rubber Plant Ends
