

Carpenters' Union Elects Tomorrow

Members of the Carpenters' union, local No. 1297, which now boasts a membership of 311, will hold its annual election and elect its officers and delegates tomorrow from 8 a. m. to 2 p. m. at the Labor temple.

Charles M. Puffer, now president of the union, is up for re-election and he is opposed by M. P. Duncan. Candidates for vice president are D. J. Vander Sluis, E. O. Cummings and A. E. Erickson.

Clarence D. Johnson and Eugene H. Larson are unopposed for the posts of recording and financial secretary, respectively, as is John Stubbaker for conductor. Ray E. Scott and C. J. Peacock have been nominated for treasurer, and Clarence Miller and Norman Williams are seeking the position of warden.

Art Cole alone has been nominated for member-at-large on the executive committee, and he and George Miller are the nominees for a five-year trustee's term. A. S. Clausen is trustee for business agent.

Nominated as delegates for various positions are the following: To the Central Labor council (elects all delegates): M. P. Duncan, E. C. Clausen, E. H. Larson and C. M. R. Puffer.

To the Metal Trades council (six to be elected—only four yet nominated): Carl J. Peacock, George Miller, Orville G. Grubb and Henry Schwanbeck.

To the Navy Yard league (three to be elected): M. G. McLeod, Herbert L. Coon and Louis LaBretaine.

92 Per Cent of Lex Crewmen Rescued

The U. S. Tanker Neosho and the U. S. destroyer Sims were attacked on the afternoon of May 17 by Japanese aircraft. The Sims sank immediately; the Neosho several days later. A large part of the crews of both ships was rescued.

The final engagement of the Coast sea battle occurred the following day, May 18, when Fletcher's task force again attacked the enemy. A second Japanese carrier, the Shokaku, was left ablaze from bomb and torpedo hits. It was while this engagement was in progress that the Lexington, flagship of Rear Admiral J. W. Fisher.

The bomb and torpedo attack caused fires aboard the carrier. The crew succeeded in extinguishing them and the Lexington's aircraft returned to its flight deck safely after carrying out their attack. But several hours later, while speeding at 20 knots, the Lexington was rocked by terrific internal explosion. Fires broke out in many parts of the ship, apparently as a result of the ignition of gas-line vapors from leaks in ruptured fuel lines.

After a heroic five-hour attempt to save the carrier, Capt. F. C. Sherman finally ordered the crew to abandon ship. Last to slide down a rope to safety was Capt. Sherman.

Judge Clears Youth on Bunco Charge

City Justice of the Peace Frank W. Ryan yesterday dismissed charges against an 18-year-old boy accused of "running" a pinball machine in a downtown tavern.

Henry A. LaBreck, Aberdeen youth, had been charged with petty larceny by asserting that money from one of the machines in a First st. tavern by use of a long wire contrived to make the machine pay. The case was tried Wednesday afternoon, and Judge Ryan deferred the passage of judgment until yesterday afternoon.

Ryan said the job of guarding against "beating" of the machines in the hands of the operators and proprietors of the establishments in which they are placed. "They will have to run the machines at their own risk. If a man is caught using a device on the machine, then it is the operator's right to eject the player from the establishment."

Judge Ryan, in dismissing the charge against young LaBreck, delivered a reprimand to the boy, saying that he did not condone nor excuse the charge and that attempting to make money by "beating" pinballs was "no way to live."

NEW YORK—Stocks made an irregular decline today with trading the smallest for any full session of the month.

Investor losses were made during the morning when the list fell toward American Telephone into lower ground. Telephone recovered 1/2 point. It subsequently recovered more than half the loss and other leaders rallied moderately.

Steel shares performed better than other major groups. Westinghouse closed at 42 1/2, up 1/2 from the previous close and Bethlehem had only a slight decline. Railroads and motors showed losses of small fractions. Most chemicals were lower but above their losses of the day. At the low of 11 1/4, Allied Chemical was off 2 points.

Goebbels Threatens Jews in Reprisal For Heavy Air Raids

BERLIN, June 12. (German Broadcast) Recorded by United Press in New York)—Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels said tonight that Germany will carry out a mass "extermination" of Jews in reprisal for the allied air bombing of German cities which, he acknowledged, have caused heavy damage.

Goebbels, in an article in the publication "Das Reich," said the Jews would be exterminated throughout Europe, "and perhaps even beyond Europe" in retaliation for heavy air assaults.

He said the Jews had, by their "treasonous play" invited British and American airmen to heavily bomb German cities.
