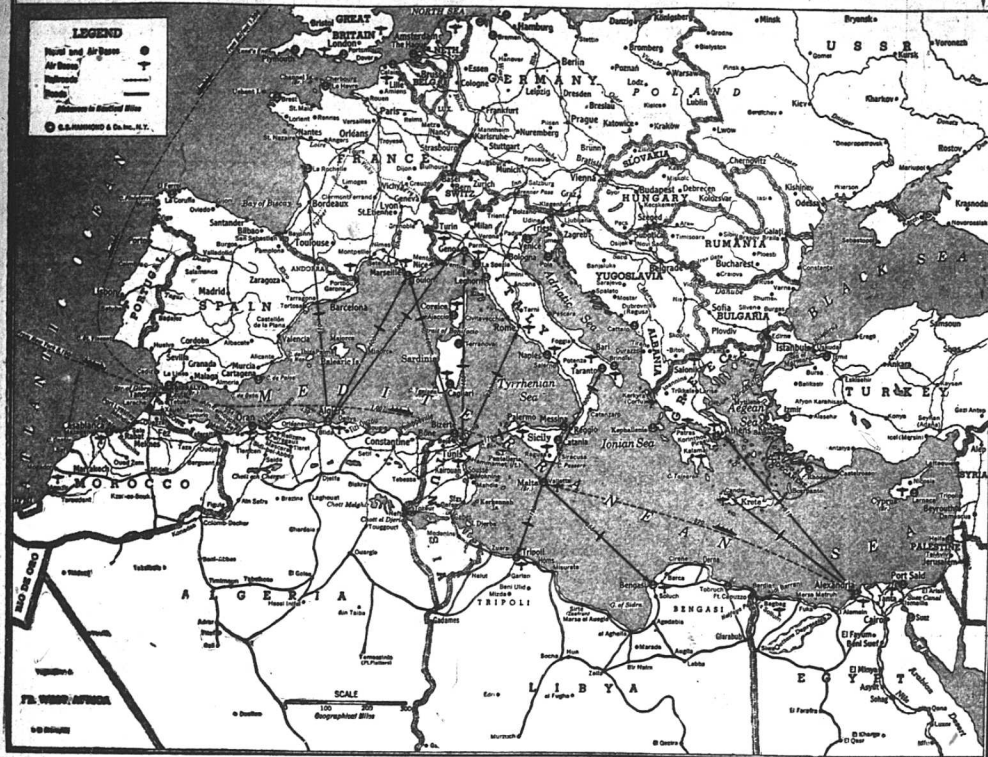

Himmler to Exterminate Polish Jews

LONDON, Nov. 24 (UP)—Heinrich Himmler, head of the Nazi Gestapo, has ordered that one-half of the large Jewish population in occupied Poland be exterminated by the end of the year, reports from the Polish underground movement to the Polish government-in-exile here said today.

The first step in the bloody program, it was said, would be to kill 50 per cent of the thousands of Jews living in ghettos established by the Nazis. The remainder would be "liquidated" later.

There were 3,115,000 Jews, or 9.8 per cent of the total population in Poland, according to the 1931 census, but the German occupation has reduced this number by killing thousands outright or permitting them to die of starvation and disease.

Bootleggers Warned on Ceiling Prices

The booming business of smugglers and bootleggers carries to whiskey-thirsty Washingtonians is receiving a price ceiling. Government operators are subject to criminal action, the office of price administration disclosed today.

As Washington entered its third week of rationing liquor at the rate of a quart a week per person, officials declared they would crack down on black market operators in the bottled goods field.

Bootleggers and smugglers were receiving as much as \$7.50 a pint for whiskey, reports indicated, from persons who couldn't get enough "smileage" from their two-pint quota to last a week.

Liquor price ceilings were frozen by the OPA as of March, 1942, and the average price for black market whiskey—between \$3 and \$4 a pint—exceeded the price ceiling in most cases.

A spokesman said the OPA planned to prosecute any price ceiling violators which were brought to attention of the agency.

Since the state was handling the rationing part of the program, the OPA was not interested in persons who sought more than their share of whiskey, but violators of price ceilings faced fines of \$10,000 and one year in prison, or both.

Gilston H. Henson, state OPA attorney, was assigned to handle the liquor price ceiling violations.

Since most of the liquor being sold in the ration-born speakeasies was bottled in legal distilleries and federal taxes paid before it was imported from surrounding non-rationed states, other federal agencies were little concerned with the upsurge of bootlegging.

Longer Work Week Certain, Says Winsor

PORTLAND, Nov. 24 (UP)—The nation's manpower shortage is virtually certain to bring about a longer work week, Gen. H. G. Winsor, regional director of the war manpower commission, said here yesterday.

Current standards demand a rest of some 75,000,000 workers, Winsor told a chamber of commerce forum. At present, the nation can count only about 55,000,000 persons employed.

Winsor estimated that about 8,000,000 women could be trained and placed in production lines during the coming year, in addition to the workers obtainable from the extreme age groups.

But even though the labor draft potentialities were realized, he said, the number of workers still would not be sufficient to meet the demands of 7,500,000 fighting men, as proposed by the government.

The only solution, he said, is to stretch the work week. Winsor suggested the Pacific Northwest could make the necessary adjustments without reverting to legislation.

\$40 Pension Plan Now Operative In State of Idaho

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 24 (UP)—By proclamation of Gov. Chase A. Clark, the Idaho senior citizens' grant initiative was a law today.

The governor issued the proclamation after the official canvass determined it had secured a majority at the last election.

The attorney general's office is now scanning the law for any legal flaws and, with the department of public assistance, is preparing a plan of operation for submission to the federal social security board.

Last week Clark said he hoped to gain the board's approval in time to meet December payments of the \$40-a-month pension plan. He said there were sufficient moneys in the public assistance fund to meet the increased cost.

Meanwhile, Gov. Clark C. A. Bottorffsen said passage of the measure was a "mandate to me" and said he would "do everything in my power to bring about the necessary action to pay the \$40-a-month pension and such other benefits as are provided for in the initiative measure."
