REVISION SEEN FOR ENTRY LAW

Jews Seek Admittance Into America

WASHINGTON—A new, large-scale attempt by Jewish and other European minorities to find homes in this country may lead to a reurvey of American immigration laws by the next congress.

Outbreaks of anti-Semitism in Germany and elsewhere have caused many more thousands of Central Europeans to seek admittance to the United States than is possible under existing laws.

Administration officials said Wednesday they anticipated a bitter struggle between members of congress wishing to relax immigration barriers for those refugees and members desiring to retain or strengthen them.

The United States is taking German Jews at the rate of about 24,000 a year, which officials estimate is more than all other countries combined are accepting.

There are now 720,000 applications for visas from other countries and the country's annual immigration quota is only 27,470. Similarly, there are 60,000 applications for visas against a quota of 6,524, and 11,000 Czechoslovakia applications against a quota of 250.

New visa restrictions have been put in effect recently to meet the needs of those clamoring for admittance to this country. As a result of anti-Jewish outbreaks abroad, applicants now must show clearly that they will not become a public charge upon their arrival in America.

Little 'War Game' Gives Cavalry Gruelling Test

Fort Brown Platoons Are Completing Hard Competition For Cash Prizes

BROWNSVILLE—There will be happy men in Ft. Brown Thursday afternoon when the official decision as to which platoon participating in the "Cavalry War Game" has been announced.

War simulated These tests, simulating war time conditions in which the platoon is given a mission on reconnaissance work in hostile territory, is devised to determine the fitness of both man and animal.

Each year the Chief of Cavalry determines the troop to be used in the test. The platoon which will compete, Regiments are rotated so as to give each one a chance at the prize money.

Another phase of the test for the officer is dismounted in which he is required to run a prescribed course of approximately three miles. A time limit is set and a minimum time is also established.

This year the contest is between the First Platoon of "A" Troop, commanded by 2nd Lt. McPherson Le Moyne and 2nd Lt. Alexander Surles, Jr. Each platoon consists of the officer as platoon commander, one platoon sergeant, one "file-closing" sergeant and three squads; each squad consisting of one corporal and seven men. There is also one orderly or messenger.

The tests were particularly difficult because it was necessary to prepare all the problems for execution on the reservation. This was due to the tick quarantine situation in the country.
