

40,000 Jews 'Liquidated' At Warsaw

LONDON, May 14.—(UP)—The entire ghetto at Warsaw, containing 40,000 Jews, has been liquidated in a 10-day battle against Nazi hordes, Rabbi Irving Miller told a press conference today on the basis of reports from Polish sources.

"Most of the Jews in the ghetto were in giant tanks, leveling streets and houses and silencing the feeble opposition to the defense in a series of extermination, the rabbi said, information from the ghetto.

"Every living soul was either butchered or uprooted and moved to some other part of the country," he added.

The rabbi's report followed recent Polish reports of gun battles in the ghetto.

F.D.R. Says U.S. Will Get About 175,000 Captives

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(UP)—President Roosevelt said today he assumed a large number of the German and Italian prisoners captured in Tunisia—estimated in press dispatches at about 375,000—would be brought to this country.

Other parts of the world, too, will fit into the picture of the disposition to be made of the 100,000 African captives, Mr. Roosevelt said in a press conference.

"This is the first time in the history of the world that the number of the prisoners has exceeded the number of the captives," he said, and transportation facilities will be made available for any captives who are not to be brought to this country.

War Prisoner Score Shows Axis Heavily 'In Red'

LONDON, May 14.—(UP)—The Axis is estimated to have lost about 800,000 men, including 200,000 Germans, killed, drowned, presumably disabled permanently or taken prisoner in the war.

German prisoners held by the British are about double the number of Britons in German prison camps, reliable estimates said.

The approximate figures showed the British hold about 150,000 Germans while some 80,000 Britons are German prisoners.

Italian prisoners, exclusive of colored troops, numbered 1,000,000 compared to 7,000 British held by the Italians.

Larceny, Robbery Laid to Employe Of Contracting Firm

On charges of larceny and robbery, John Pasco, 38, Fort Orchard, was today transferred to the county jail and is being held in lieu of \$10,000 bail.

Pasco was arrested by Bremerton police last Saturday night in connection with the striking and robbery of Donald Gormley, 44, also of Fort Orchard, in the vicinity of the ferry crossing at Gormley, knocked almost unconscious, local police detectives he had been robbed of a briefcase, which contained some \$40.

Pasco was held in the city jail during the past week while police investigated his record. Prosecutor Fred B. Cohen, who had the man transferred to the county jail, said Pasco's record was "anything but good" in the past. He was an employe of a local contracting firm.

Soldier Sentry Aids Arrest

Violation of a basic fundamental of crime—that of being familiar with the avenues of escape available to a burglar—was the key to the arrest of a convicted man in the city jail last night when he drove onto the site of a new building.

The sailor, William L. Adams, 21, was booked by police on charges of burglary and taking an automobile without the owner's permission. Bail was set at \$10,000 and Adams was taken this afternoon to the county jail.

Two police officers pursued the car during the night, about 10 o'clock last night when they saw the speeding recklessly about the downtown business district after a chase of several blocks, Adams was arrested and taken to the city street and attempted to escape by driving onto the military site near the waterfront.

He was challenged and stopped by a police officer, and police then closed in and arrested him, first on the reckless driving charge, and later on the charge of taking the car. He had been taken from the front of a Warrenton auto, the first indication to the police that the machine Adams was driving was a stolen car.

172 nautical miles east of Attu, a Tokyo broadcast, which preceded the navy's announcement by about eight hours said that "crack" American troops were fighting on Attu, and that "severe fighting is now going on."

The enemy is believed to have an airfield and naval installations at Attu. It is believed that the navy has developed air facilities, naval installations and a submarine base. Another base, always held, "makes up" in the Attu area and normally moves eastward. The American possession of Attu would make it possible for U.S. sea and air forces based there to move on Kiska under the direction of eastward moving "weather fronts."

Furious Air Battle Over Solomons
WASHINGTON, May 14.—(UP)—The Japanese navy today lost 200 Zeros and probably destroyed two more in a furious air battle in the Solomons, the navy announced today.

Two U.S. planes were lost, but two of the pilots were saved. The battle took place near the Russell Canal, just northwest of Guadalcanal, on May 13 and 14. Three American airmen took on about 25 enemy fighters in a fierce air battle in the Solomons for several weeks, according to the navy.
