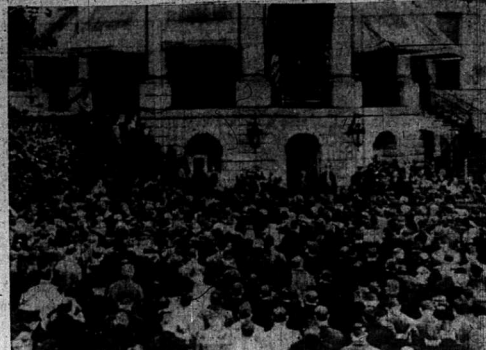

Sgt. Lewis Is Luncheon Will Nazi Prisoner Honor Gillette

Permanet address and a list of the location of the German prison camp where her husband, Sgt. Lewis, is interned was revealed to Mrs. Virginia Lewis of Oslo in a recent communication from the war department.

Sgt. Lewis is believed to have been a German prisoner who was shot down over Germany. He is now a prisoner at Stalag Luft No. 4, which is near the Baltic Sea. According to the recent message from the war department, Mrs. Lewis first received notice that her husband was a prisoner of war in September on a form card mailed in Germany in July. She is believed to send one package to him every two months.

Sgt. Lewis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Lewis of Silverdale, and worked in the supply department in the Navy Yard prior to his induction into the armed services two years ago. He and his wife, formerly Virginia Davies of Bristol's Point, are graduates of Central Kitsap high school.
