went through the walls of Dachau camp. At first glance the camp seemed loaded with dirty clothing. Then you saw feet, heads, and legs hanging from the walls. Hundreds of bodies. Downard was driving a jeep along a string of cars when a soldier shouted: "Come here, quick, here's a live one!" Downard climbed over the pile of bodies to one man, his neck small and shriveled. It scarcely seemed capable of holding a head. He put the man in his jeep and carried him to a hospital where plasma was keeping him alive.

Yanks Enraged Over Japanese Suicide Hit on Hospital Ship

GUAK, April 30.—(AP)—American troops enraged over a Japanese pilot's suicidal attack on two airmen on the hospital ship evacuating their wounded buddies fought doggedly today for an hour to prevent the Japanese objective on southern Okinawa. The fully-loaded, unarmored hospital ship, the Comfort, was attacked and heavily damaged 50 miles south of Okinawa. Twenty-two were killed, 33 wounded and 100 missing.

War Nearing End' LONDON, April 30.—(AP)—A commentary on the Hamburg radio, the chief remaining voice of Nazi Germany, declared tonight: "Everybody knows that this war is drawing to an end. This is an irrevocable fact."

Seventh army troops mopped up in Munich, birthplace of Adam, entered Sunday when Americans in Italy pushed into patriot-liberated Milan, the cradle of Italian fascism and Italy's largest city (pop. 1,115,000). Other units killed or seized the SS guards at Dachau concentration camp, freeing some 32,000 prisoners. Americans of the 13th army crossed the Isar river in a new push toward Berchtesgaden, 25 miles or less away.

Turin Occupied by Jap-American Army

ROME, April 30.—(AP)—The American Fifth army entered Turin today. The 42nd regiment composed of American troops of Japanese ancestry entered the great city of 650,000 and found it controlled by Italian patriots. The 21st division and the sixth South African armored division captured Treviso, 15 miles north of Venice.

Lights Go on Again in Moscow Tonight

MOSCOW, April 30.—(UP)—Moscow's four-year blackout will be lifted tonight. The capital is being celebrated with hunting, big-colored streamers and victory posters in preparation for the May day celebration which may coincide with the fall of Berlin. The Kremlin's five-point stars have been repainted. Bronze church spires which have been almost for years have been repaired and will toll again on victory day.

Firemen Called

Capt. Mallard in Command Of New Cruiser Bremerton

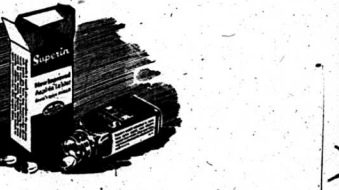
