FOUR POLITICS PROFESSORS **ENGAGED IN WRITING BOOKS**

C. R. Erdman Jr., L. H. Evans, W. S. Myers and H. H. Sprout Will Finish Works Soon.

Four new books in the field of politics are now being written by Professors Charles R. Erdman Jr., Luther H. Evans, William S. Myers and Harold H. Sprout.

Professor Erdman's book is "A Study of the Present Constitution of New Jersey," dealing with past movements for reform and analyzing the needed changes. In length between 75 to 100 pages, it will be published next April or May.

"The Government of the Virgin Islands of the United States" is the title of the book now being written by Professor Evans and which he hopes to have completed within a few

Now in the hands of the publishers, Professor Myers' "Life of General McClellan" will appear some time next spring, the author at present being engaged in reading over the proof.

"American Foreign Policies" is the name of Professor Sprout's volume. This is a topical analysis and general treatise of the subject, designed for use as a text book in history and politics courses on American diplomatic history and foreign policies. It is now about four-fifths done and will go to press next summer, being published by Henry Holt & Co. in the American Political Science Series edited by Professor Edward S. Cor-
