Kaulukukui attracted attention early in the Hawaii-UCLA game at Los Angeles when he galloped 103 yards for a touchdown after receiving a kick-off.

Several of the scribes wrote following the UCLA-Hawaii game that Kaulukukui was the best halfback they had seen all season.

One writer declared that Kaulukukui could make any star team in the country.

Kaulukukui has a long football career ahead of him. If he improves the way Hiram Kaakua has since he finished school Tommy will be the best ever developed here.

PLAN TO IMPORT MANY PRO SCRAPPERS

SIDELIGHTS OF TILT SATURDAY

As one fan aptly put it, "the pre-game and half time shows alone were well worth the price of admission."

The show started at about quarter past 2 p. m. with Brig. Gen. Robert S. Abert's 142 piece, red juncos steel helmeted consolidated Honolulu sector band, which was preceded by the massed colors of the Aloha Temple, Punahou academy, Roosevelt high and Kam-hameha school.

Following in order were the McKinley high band with ROTC color bearers and the sponsors and cadet officers preceded by the school color bearers; the St. Louis College band, colors and three sponsors; the Kamehameha school band, colors and three sponsors; the Oahu Sugar Co. band; the U. S. Marine band; the Punahou colors and sponsors; the Aloha Temple band, colors and two platoons of the Aloha Temple patrol dressed in plush green costumes and wearing red sashes.

With the last element of the parade in position facing the main grandstand, Bandmaster Olof M. Nord led the entire massed band of some 624 pieces in playing "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles, the Shrine hospital theme song, as youngsters along the sidelines released large bunches of multi-colored balloons. It was almost a life and death race to make a lasting impression on the large holiday throng.

And it was indeed a rarely beautiful sight—the splashes of color from the uniformed bands, the breaks and escorts on the green field; the bill of that waving "Bubble" song, and the hundreds upon hundreds of iridescent balloons floating from the field, outlined against the sky, then wafted gently toward the distant green hills on the reef like a breeze—like a Maxfield Parrish scene, like the dreams of children at play!

Immediately afterward the massed bands, led by Mr. Nord, played Hawaii solemn and finally the Star Spangled Banner.

Innocently unmindful at the outset that Kam school was singing its alma mater hymn just before the start of the game, the Aloha Stars warming up on the field quickly stopped and came to attention.

Alex. Kong, pro at the Palolo municipal links Sunday sponsored a successful kickers' contest. This is a competition where a player may replay any one shot he misses during the contest. Full handicaps were allowed.

George Ching and Chan Chung, both of whom took full advantage of the rule, were the winners. Alex. Mungui took low gross with a 68, which is six under par.

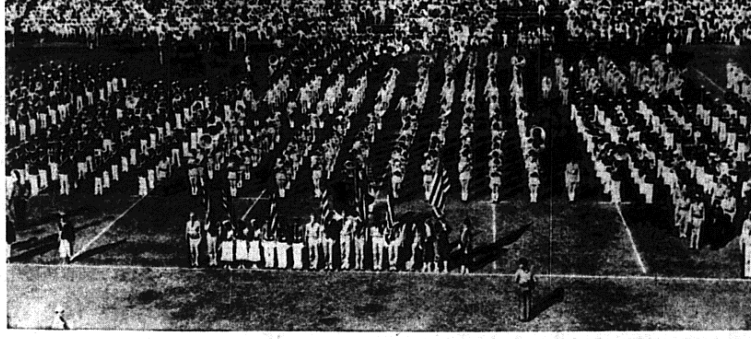

Combining deception with power the San Jose State college Spartans at the Honolulu stadium over a team composed of Kamehameha school and Kamehameha Alumni players.

The visitors, who outwitted the locals more than 10 pounds to the man, had altogether less merrh power. They ripped wide holes in the Kam line, circled the ends and gained on lateral and forward passes.

Had the local team not been reinforced by the addition of several Kamalumu players the slaughter would have been pitiful. The Spartans are more in the class with our senior teams.

It was evident from the start that the light Kam line was not able to hold the visitors. Lewis gained seven yards through center on the very first play of the game, and Watson went through tackle for five yards on the second play.

The Spartans drove 37 yards for the first touchdown. The drive was featured by a 37 yard gain by Lewis. Watson went the last ten yards for a touchdown, going by a big hole at right tackle without being touched by a Kam player. The try for point failed.

The Spartans scored again after 10 minutes of play in the second quarter when Argilla booted a field goal from placement on an angle from

## United States To Have Full Squad In Olympic Games

NEW YORK, Dec. 9. (AP)—The AAU convention at its final session Sunday ratified full United States participation in the 1936 Olympic Games, defeating all attempts to boycott the games in protest to Nazi policies.

The convention qualified its decision only by withholding endorsement of the policies of the Nazi government.

After their second defeat in two days, forces advocating the boycott joined in the unanimous vote favoring participation, while at the same time calling upon international authorities to keep a vigilant watch upon conditions in Germany to safeguard the Olympic principles of fair play.

Avery Brundage of Chicago was unanimously elected president of the AAU for his seventh term.
