JEWS BOYCOTTED

In Goerlitz, a city of 92,000 in goutheastern Germany, Nazi leaders ordered the boycott committee to picket Jews' stores from 11 A. M. until 5 P. M. despite assurances of the government that the boycott action would be limited to Saturday.

Although Nazi leaders say the boy-cott will be renewed Wednesday if the attitude abroad regarding reports of anti-Jewish activities does not improve. Saturday's embargo ap-peared likely to be the last wide-spread, organized affair of that kind, at least for the present.

The committee further ordered that signs to be used in any subsequent demonstration be restricted to read-ing "Jewe".
