Tests Show Nothing

The mystery partly was solved by animal experiments. When dogs and other animals, with a laboratory-induced type of high blood pressure, were given vitamin A, their pressures took spectacular

### Concentrate Helps

This was apparently proved when irradiation was used to destroy all the vitamin A in the concentrate. The vitaminless material still cured he animals.

There is a remote chance, Dr. Page said, that in the careful human tests, the concentrates used did not happen to have enough of the mysterious fish-oil substance.
