## Draft Reaches Into Arabia To Find Its Man

Chicago Daily News Foreign Service CAIRO, May 10.—The long arm of the draft board reached far into the vast emptiness of the Arabian Desert last week and got one more guy for the armed forces of the United States: Kenneth Keatinge of Berkeley, Calif.

Envoy of the Office of Economic Warfare in Cairo to the anti-locust front in Saudi Arabia, Keatinge was having coffee with the local emir, 300 miles from anywhere, when a jeep with a British Tommy at the wheel came over the rise. He had a telegram for Keatinge, which said in effect, Uncle Sam needs you.

Keatinge thanked the emir for the coffee, got in the jeep and for the next three days and nights drove 300 miles to the Persian Gulf. A half-day by boat took him to Bahrain and two days by air brought him to Cairo, where he is now awaiting transportation to the United States for induction into the armed forces.

After leaving the States with the American Field Service in February, 1942, Keatinge served 14 months with the British Desert Army and drove an ambulance in the Battle of El Alamein. (Copyright, 1944.)

## W. VA. ELECTION IS NIP-AND-TUCK

A nip-and-tuck race for the Republican gubernatorial nomination in West Virginia marked the political picture today while the Democratic tilt became more and more one-sided, with Rush Holt, the former "boy senator," trailing. In Ohio, Cleveland Mayor Frank J. Lausche was well ahead in the race for the Democratic nomination for governor and Republican Senator Robert A. Taft, gained re-nomination without opposition.

The status of election races in the two states was:

West Virginia Republican gubernatorial: Mayor D. Boone Dawson of Charleston held 33,125 votes and Raymond J. Funkhouser, mill-industrialist of Charlestown, 30,676, with 1,011 of 2,796 precincts reporting.

Democratic gubernatorial: Circuit Judge Clarence W. Meadows of Beckley, led Holt, of Weston, 50,985 to 21,048 in 1,030 precincts.

Ohio Democratic gubernatorial: With returns in from 3,337 of the state's 9,180 polling places, the standings were: Lausche, 41,045; Martin L. Sweeney, 20,835; James W. Huffman, 12,184; Reams, 10,303; Frank A. Dye, 3,626; Walter Baertschi, 2,753.

Republican gubernatorial: Returns from 3,343 polling places gave Mayor James Garfield Stewart of Cincinnati 58,823; Lieut. Gov. Paul M. Herbert, 42,958; Attorney-General Thomas J. Herbert, 42,762; and Albert E. Payne, 4,743.

Democratic gubernatorial: Returns from 3,238 polling places: William G. Pickrel, 33,846; John Taylor, 15,554, and Marvin C. Harrison, 14,798.

Meanwhile, the chief national political note was the continued refusal of President Roosevelt to discuss the fourth-term issue. Asked at his news conference about the statement of Chairman Robert E. Hannegan of the Democratic National Committee, who expressed belief Mr. Roosevelt would be a successful candidate, the Chief Executive said he was not going to talk about it any more than before.

Texas: Democrats looked forward today to their state convention at Austin May 23, where the fourth-term question, which colored many county conventions yesterday, may get another going over.

The New Deal drew rocks and roses from Texans as hot words and close voting marked the county conventions.

## Technicians Hit Contracts For Petrillo's Men

WASHINGTON, May 10.—(AP)—A union of radio technicians, who sit in a little glass booth and control the technical angles of broadcasting, has served notice it will strike if James C. Petrillo's musicians' union is given a contract to operate record-playing equipment on the air.

A. T. Powley, president of the National Association of Broadcast Engineers and Technicians, announced that he had written to Secretary of Labor Perkins, the War Labor Board and the National Labor Relations Board, giving the required 30 days' notice of intention to strike in the event Petrillo gets the contract, reported already entered into with the National Broadcasting Company. Such notice is required under the Smith-Connally Act.

## Trunk - Murder Suspect Tells Of Killing Wife

CRYSTAL CITY, Texas, May 10.—(AP)—A confession that he killed his wife, Mrs. Louise Villegos, by hitting her in the back of the head with his fist and shipped her body in a trunk from Chicago to Los Angeles has been signed here by Soya Villegos, 26 years old, Deputy Sheriff Garrett Barnes said last night.

Barnes quoted Villegos as saying that: Villegos did not know the woman was dead until he attempted to revive her.

That Villegos struck Mrs. Villegos during an argument, following a visit to a Chicago tavern, where the two had had some drinks.

That Villegos put the body into a trunk the next day, left their apartment and located a man friend. That he did not tell the man what was in the trunk, but that he had the friend and a cab driver haul the trunk from the apartment to the Chicago Union Station. That it was the friend who sent the trunk to Los Angeles in care of "John Lopez."

## State Accountant Meeting Planned

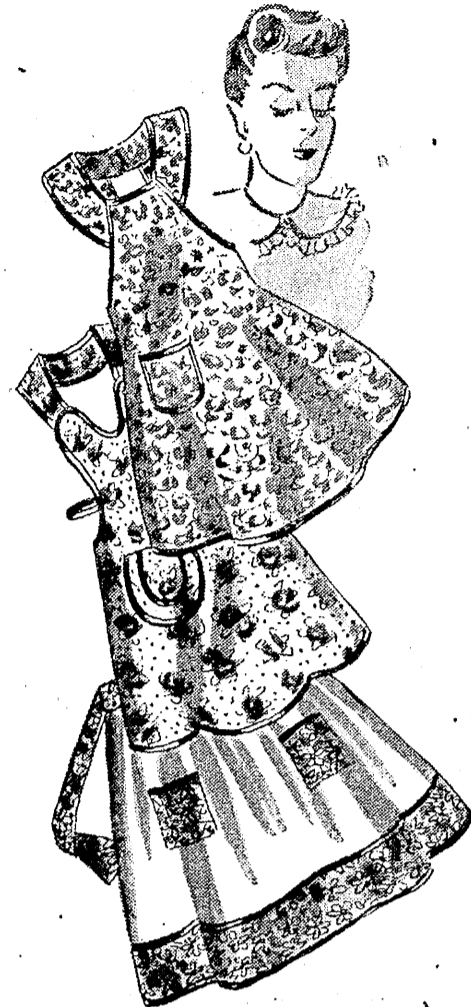

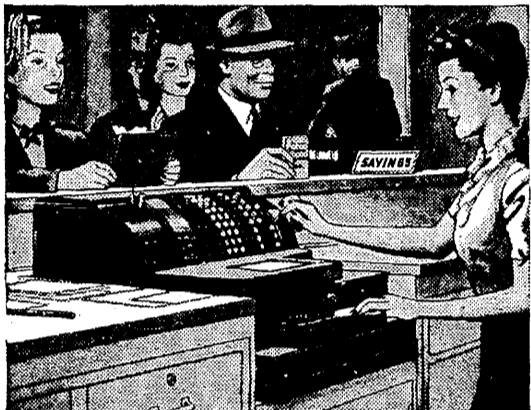

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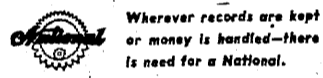
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
