Two Arrested In Berlin,

Berlin, Nov. 10.—(UP)—Ameri-
 cans today felt the wrath of the

 and others protested to the U. S.
 Consulate against destruction
 and looting of their shops by Nazi
 mobs.

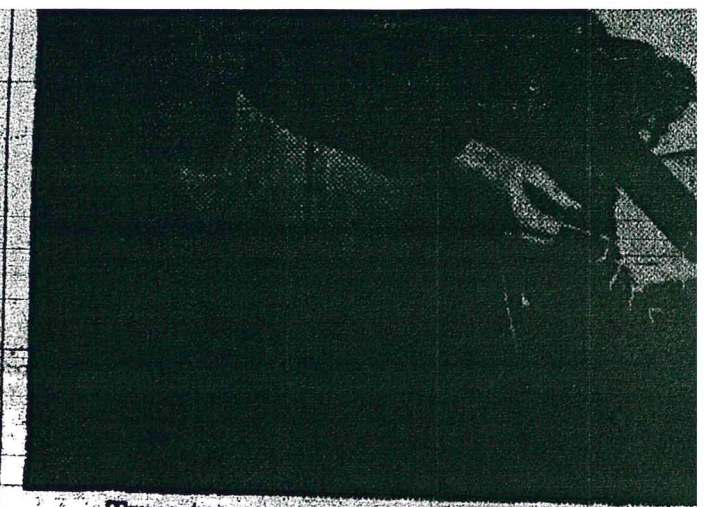

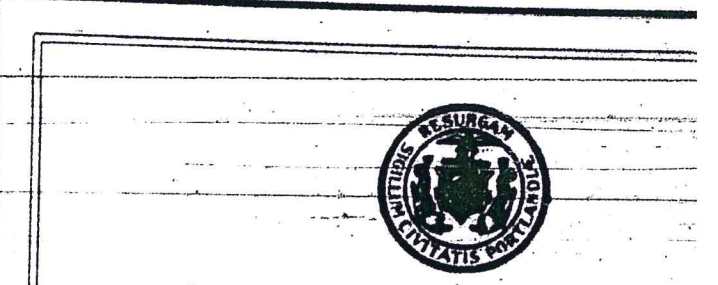

terror in the streets and were released after questioning. Another American was arrested in Vienna.

Dr. Laurence K. Etter of Los Angeles was seized by police and held for two hours at a precinct station because he tried to take motion pictures of smashed Jewish shops.

Anton Celler, of Hampden, Conn., was arrested by a plain-clothes stormtrooper on Unter Den Linden and was taken to a police station where he resisted efforts to confiscate his camera, with which he had taken several pictures. The American Consulate finally obtained his release and he retained his camera.

Carter Royston Bryan of Peoria, Ill., a correspondent of the London Times, was arrested by Nazi police in Vienna near the scene of a burning synagogue in the second district, set on fire by a Nazi mob.

Stormtroopers seized Bryan as he was taking notes on the destruction and hauled him off to a police station. Police later released him with an apology and a reprimand to Stormtroopers who had seized him.

He returned to the synagogue and was arrested again by another group but was released en route to the police station when he was recognized by the men who had arrested him the first time.

Berlin stores of three naturalized Americans, all of whom are in the United States at present, were entered and damaged during the day of terror, according to reports reaching the American Consulate.

In two of the three cases looting was reported.
